Two free magazines you may not have seen dropped onto my desk this month. The first is from the Registered Professional Turner (RPT) organization in the UK. They have just revamped their magazine and made it free to everyone, not just RPT members. The second comes from the Worshipful Company of Turners of London. This organization in the UK is "one of the oldest Livery Companies in the City of London, the Turners' Company was already a guild in the 12th Century. Some 200 years later, Edward III decreed that 'wooden measures, as well for wine as for ale' should be made only by 'turnours' with marks of their own – and the medieval turners established the English 'pint' as an official measure. In 1604 the Company received its Royal Charter from James I. To this day the Company continues to celebrate and support the 'art or mysterie' of turning." Tips and Tricks

This month's Tip is provided by Mike Fraser:

For many of us, a razor knife is an indispensable shop tool. When the blade gets dull, we turn it around to expose the unused end; then replace it when that end dulls.

Do you discard the dull blade? I don't.

These old blades make wonderful, custom-shaped, cabinet scrapers. Just take the old blade to a belt or disc sander and sand off the tapered edge, leaving it square with the sides. The grinding produces a wire edge that cuts beautifully. They work great removing slight tear-out on bowls or platters, inside or out, depending on how you shape the edge. A caution, the blades get HOT when grinding, so hold it with Vise-Grip pliers, a metal clamp, or similar.



Once it dulls, just grind again. And once it gets too small to hold comfortably, then discard it guilt-free, having gotten double duty from a common item.

Guest Editorial

Herb Stripper

I was recently asked by one of my friends if I could make her a herb stripper. I had no idea what that is, but of course I said yes. A quick research session on Google came up with a device to easily strip the leaves etc. from a "branch" of a herb (think rosemary, or thyme). I found pictures of two types of stripper on the web.



So, being a wood turner, I obviously chose the bowl type. Now I needed more research about the size of the bowl and the holes in it. I decided to go with about four inches for the diameter of the bow, and about 2-3 inches deep. The holes were a bit tougher, but I decided on five holes 1/8, 3/16, ¼, 5/16, and 3/8 inches. I decided on putting them all on

the same axis and that the spacing between the holes should be approximately equal.





I picked a piece of wood from my stash and set to. I mounted it between centers to start.





After turning it to rough shape I made a tenon.



Next was to drill the holes. A previous experiment had shown that this stage has to be done before the bowl is hollowed out as there is a major risk of breaking the bowl. I also found out during this that several of my brad point drills are not

perfectly straight. So these had to be replaced.



Bowl is now sanded to 400 and sanding sealer is applied.





Bowl is hollowed out being careful to leave enough supporting mass in the bowl until the top section is to the correct thickness. I chose about ¼ inch.



More sanding, again to 400, and more sanding sealer.



A coat of final finish is now added to the bowl. I chose Waterlox Original. This is a catalyzed tung oil finish and is food safe when dry. I wanted a finish that the user did not have to worry about. I put two coats on the bowl.



Finally, I turned the bowl around and mounted it back on the lathe to turn off the tenon. I used Cole Jaws, but I could have used a jam chuck or a vacuum chuck (not easy because of the holes). The final stage was to finish the base and add my logo.

Here is the finished item.
