A Natural Edge

C.A. (Cajun) Savoy, show director for the Capitol Area Woodturners, gave the members a lesson in turning natural edge bowls, and with some help from Don Riggs, adjusted Dick Krehling's wood lathe at the March 2 meeting.

A turner who has been around the (wood) block more than a few times, Savoy detailed cutting the blank, balancing and chucking it and scribing the tenon.

Savoy emphasized that improper scribing can lead to serious accidents, pulling the scribe out of your hand and maybe into some other part of you.

Other safety aspects included always using eye and face protection.


During the demonstration, Savoy invited members to come up one by one, to a safe area to his left, to see what he was doing.

Savoy was using a very large blank, approximately 10 by 20 inches, a soft green maple that weighed up to 35 pounds. With a piece of wood this big, even with a first-class lathe such as Krehling's "Oneway," safety has to be a priority. Savoy teaches a monthly class at Woodcraft supply company in Springfield and another, bi-monthly at the Bryant Center, so teaching safety is a priority with him.

Savoy prefers to use a half-inch bowl gouge with a modified Ellsworth grind. He also makes first-class turning tools in his shop, including scrapers and heavy duty, deep-hollowing tools, in addition to custom tool rests and other accessories. He produces the quality of manufactured tools, but at a more reasonable price.

The demonstrator for the April 6 meeting will be Mike McInerney who is the treasurer for the Capitol Area Woodturners.



Club Logo Adopted


At the March meeting, the club members adopted a logo for the Apple Valley Woodturners. It is an apple, pierced with a gouge. The idea was created by Tim Gregory.
